FUNDING AND PLACES BOOST FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

Conservative County Council invests more than £30m in our children.

Steve Brine has welcomed news that Hampshire County Council have delivered 1300 new places and spent over £32m on Winchester schools since 2013, following a long running campaign.

A baby boom in 2008 led to a serious shortage in the number of primary places and Steve made the issue a local priority upon being elected working alongside colleagues including Cllr Fiona Mather.

The result was the expansion of a number of city primary schools as well as the opening of the first 'all-through'

5-16 school at Westgate, visited recently by the Education Secretary.

Steve told The Winchester Post; "The figures speak for themselves but the reality for young parents such as myself is peace of mind in a state system locally that has every school ranked 'good' or 'outstanding'. Of course there will always be issues around sibling entry and school transport, because ultimately we're dealing with people's lives, but the capacity challenge has been met and that's great.

"Equally, nobody is complacent and great thought has been given to the



inevitable secondary 'bulge' as the new baby boomers head for 'big school' later this decade. I am confident we have a local school system that is where we need it to be; now and for the future."

GOOD NEWS FOR LOCAL COMMUTERS

Big wins as the government publishes details of the new South Western rail franchise.



The Invitation to Tender has emerged for the company who will run future local train services.

Specified improvements include at least 95 additional services per day Monday to Friday from December 2018, earlier and later trains on many routes from December 2018, an increase of 20% in capacity at peak time from December 2020 and faster journey times on at least 70% of all services from December

Also included are an improved fares and ticketing experience that includes introducing smart ticketing to cater for part-time commuters, swifter compensation arrangements, improved punctuality and fewer cancellations.

Steve Brine says; "These are a very welcome list of demands from government, and it has been made clear to bidders that these are the bare minimum expected. Smart ticketing was a manifesto commitment I won so it's pleasing we're now seeing progress."

Network Rail invested over £3.6 million in recent years to deliver improvements at Winchester Station including the new footbridge and car park. The Department for Transport expects to announce the preferred bidder in February 2017 with the new franchise planned to start next June.

UoW PRAISED IN PARLIAMENT

The success of the University of Winchester's degree apprenticeship program was raised in the House of Commons in June. Responding to a question from Steve Brine, the Universities Minister said the Sparkford Road facility was "exceptionally strong", performing consistently well with regards to both student satisfaction surveys and graduate prospects.

Jo Johnson MP confirmed Winchester was "leading the way" in degree apprenticeships, and noted that 95% of its students go on to employment or further study.

Church leaders from across Winchester joined Steve in Westminster this Summer for a very special breakfast event.

The National Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast, which is organised by Christians in Parliament, is an annual opportunity for Parliamentarians and their guests to gather for a variety of speeches, music and prayer. Joining Mr Brine this year were Revd Phil Collins from Alresford, Nigel Hemming of the Winchester Vineyard Church and Revd David Rowe from Christ Church.

The MP also spoke of his concerns over new powers being used inappropriately but added that many of his constituents will take the view that, if someone has nothing to hide, they have nothing to fear. A SPECTRUM OF OBSTACLES

Steve Brine has warmly welcomed news that autism knowledge is to be included in the Initial Teacher Training Framework, after the All Party Autism Group campaign on the issue.

The MP says; "Our goal was for autism to be included in the new framework of core content for ITT courses, and it's great this has finally happened."

At the same time, a new report from the Westminster Commission on Autism has called for improved access to healthcare for all autistic people following a major inquiry.

Steve adds; "This population group can have increased health risks and reduced life expectancy, yet still face multiple obstacles to accessing the same healthcare that other population groups enjoy. It is clear that the knock-on effect on physical and mental health, and subsequently on employment chances, leads us to request positive action now."

NEW CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

Two million steps campaign launched after Winchester MP lands £2m in Budget.



Winchester MP Steve Brine is playing a key role in the campaign to bring the first dedicated children's hospital to the South.

Back in the Spring, he welcomed £2m of matched Government funding announced by the Chancellor and is now backing the **#2MillionSteps** campaign which aims to raise the other half.

The push for the facility, to be built at Southampton General Hospital, is being led by well-known actors Sarah Parish and Jim Murray. The couple, who live near Winchester, set up the Murray-Parish Trust after they lost their eight month old daughter at the hospital in 2009.

They joined forces with Steve, the Southern Daily Echo and a cross-party group of MPs to make the new facility a reality.

Steve Brine told *The Winchester Post*; "We were delighted to receive the money in the Budget and now our focus moves to local fundraising."

In other news, Southampton has been confirmed as a regional centre of excellence for paediatric cardiac surgery after the **congenital heart disease review** finally concluded this Summer. Steve adds; "This has been a long and slow process but it had to be right and, above all, it had to be clinically sound. I know there has been a rigorous assessment by clinicians taking a national overview to deliver world class outcomes for children and their families and that is as it should be."

NEW FLOOD DEFENCES FOR CITY



Winchester County Councillor Fiona Mather (who represents the East side of the city) has welcomed news that flood defences will be strengthened thanks to a £895,000 project led by Conservative run Hampshire County Council.

Fiona told The Winchester Post; "A low wall with deployable flood barriers at openings will be built around North Walls and the Park Avenue area including St Bede School, The Art College, and homes and businesses. In addition, wider work across Hampshire will also take place in partnership with the Environment Agency."

Steve Brine MP added; "This is really good news, and Fiona Mather, who represents the area on the county council has been central in landing this deal. We're pleased the scheme received positive feedback during the public consultation last year and is set to be completed by Christmas."

PITT VALE BID THROWN OUT

A proposal by Linden Homes to build 350 houses at Pitt Vale has been rejected by the city council.

The plans, which were submitted when the neighbouring Winchester Village site at Pitt Manor was still being built, had been highly controversial, with Steve Brine and ClIr Jan Warwick hearing from a large number of local residents who had been against the scheme.

Steve Brine said: "This was the right decision. We have spoken to so many constituents over the past two years so know just how relieved they will be."

Cllr Jan Warwick added; "Moving forward, speculative developers should be very aware that Winchester has a signed-off Local Plan and will defend it robustly. We fully expect Linden to appeal so I am already working with fellow councillors and residents to ensure we're ready."

CONSERVATIVE LOCAL ELECTION WIN

Winchester Conservatives comfortably retained control of the City Council in May after all-out elections were held.

Every seat on the council was up for grabs after boundary changes reduced the total number of councillors from 57 to 45, and with all votes counted, the Conservatives have a clear majority with 25 seats.

Steve Brine said: "I look forward to working with all councillors – of all parties - in their wards for the benefit of constituents. I was sorry to see Labour disappear from the council altogether; they will be back I am sure."

South Wonston has a brand new Pavilion - officially opened in September by Lawrie McMenemy.

MP Steve Brine attended the event, alongside Cllr Stephen Godfrey who lives in the village, the Mayor of Winchester and local residents.

Cutting the ribbon, the Saints legend spoke of his support for the new half-a-million pound facility situated at the Recreation Ground. It has been managed by South Wonston Parish Council with financial support from The Football Foundation and the Ministry of Defence.

TEN YEAR-OLD BABIES

Winchester Breastfeeding support group, BABIES, celebrated ten years with a party for young families in October.

The service was set up in 2006 by Jane Moffett and Jennie Gavin with the help of a National Lottery grant and has helped thousands of new mums since. Steve Brine recently visited an awardwinning local business as the latest employment figures for Winchester show our area continues to be among the very best in the country. Just 0.7% of the economically active population aged 16 to 64 are currently looking for work.

Anchor Pipework, who are based in Otterbourne, scooped the main Business of the Year Award at the 2016 Winchester Business Excellence Awards.
